Meet your Summer Community Resource Deputy


When the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office began providing law enforcement services to the City of Troutdale, we committed to continuing the Troutdale Police Department's practice of having an officer patrolling Glenn Otto Park during the busy summer months. This year, City Manager Ray Young and I took a hard look at this position to see if we could come up with a creative way to expand the service provided by this deputy to other areas within the city limits. This collaborative effort resulted in the creation of an innovative new position in the form of a *Troutdale Summer Community Resource Deputy*.

This summer, *Deputy Travis Yates* (pictured at right) has stepped into this new role. Deputy Yates will be working during peak recreational days – Friday through Monday. On hot, busy days community members can see Deputy Yates at Glenn Otto Park talking with visitors and reminding folks of park rules: alcohol and glass containers are not allowed, and **pets can't be brought to the beach area**. When weather or other factors limit the use of Glenn Otto Park, he will be addressing livability issues throughout the city and working with Troutdale's year-round **Community Resource Deputy Nick Bohrer**.

If you see Deputy Yates around town, please say hello!

Eligible for a discount on your sewer rate? Read on.



The City has a sewer rate discount program to help residents who are disabled or elderly, and have limited income. If you are over the age of 65, or have been determined to be disabled, you may be eligible for the program.

For the senior discount, your income must be less than 80% of the county median income (family of one in 2022, \$37,300), and for the disabled discount 50% (family of one in 2022)

\$59,680). Larger households have greater income thresholds. If you qualify for the program, you will receive a 50% reduction in your monthly sewer rate.

Heading for the beach at Glenn Otto Park?

Here are a few safety tips to remember!

- If you can't swim Don't Go In! Know your abilities before you jump!
- Throw Don't Go Throw a flotation device, call 9-1-1 if someone is in trouble
- Don't jump in unless you are a trained rescuer
- Be aware of hidden hazards like cold shock, rocks, snags
- Keep children within arm's reach at all times.
- Don't fight the current if swept away, face downstream and look for a calm place to get out
- No Alcohol on the beach or in the park
- Dogs are not allowed on the beach even if on a leash
- No glass containers of any kind allowed
- Pick up after yourself don't leave a mess
- Borrow lifejackets for all ages at the Lifeguard Shack, free of charge.

Pavement Maintenance Gets Underway

Summer is upon us and you know what that means: Tis the season for pavement maintenance! If pavement maintenance work will occur on your street, you will receive a notice in the mail regarding this upcoming work that will proceed over the course of the summer and early fall. This summer's work will consist of three types, varying for different streets, with some streets crack-sealed, others slurrysealed, and some getting full-depth spot pavement patches. Some streets getting slurry sealed will also see spot repairs performed ahead of the surface treatment to address localized weak spots in the pavement structure. The type of maintenance applied to a given street is

selected carefully by our engineers and maintenance staff using pavement inspection data, pavement history, and a pavement condition computer model that is validated with field observations by the engineering and streets maintenance staff. These preservation treatments extend the life of asphalt pavements, and over the long term are a much more cost-effective approach than allowing pavements to degrade to the point that they must be fully reconstructed at much greater cost. These methods are aimed to get the most bangfor-the-buck from the public's State and Local gas tax dollars.

The City understands that these pavement maintenance projects are disruptive. Troutdale has great streets and hopes that residents and business owners understand how important it is to perform these maintenance activities to ensure our streets remain that way for the long term. Please bear with us, knowing that a few days of inconvenience pays off with years of good quality pavement.

The City will mail notifications to affected residents prior to construction, and the contractor will distribute door hanger notifications 48 hours in advance, along with street sign notifications at least 24 hours in advance for no parking areas or other impacts. Schedules can change on very short notice due to weather, equipment breakdowns, etc., so please pay close attention to notifications and signage. What's Your Lawn Style?

Through a partnership between the Clean Rivers Coalition and Oregon State University Extension Service, *What's Your Lawn Style* is a public service campaign with short informational videos that offer free tips to homeowners for any level of lawn maintenance—low, medium, or high. Viewers will learn how to maintain their lawns at a level of effort that is right for them, with little or no pesticides and fertilizer. The result? Goodlooking lawns that are safe for kids and pets, while keeping chemical runoff out of our waterways.

10 ways to curb your water use

Looking for tips to save water while still maintaining a vibrant landscape? Here are 10 ways to curb water use from the Regional Water Providers Consortium:

- 1. Adjust your sprinklers so that they're watering your lawn and garden, and not the street or sidewalk.
- 2. Water early in the morning (before 10 a.m.) or later in the evening (after 6 p.m.) when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.
- 3. Set it, but don't forget it! Whether you have a manual or automatic system, be sure to adjust your watering schedules throughout the irrigation season.
- 4. Water established lawns about one (1) inch per week (a bit more during hot, dry weather). Find out how much to water this week with the Weekly Watering Number by going to: https://www.regionalh2o.org/
- 5. Inspect your overall irrigation system for leaks, broken lines or blockage in the lines. A well-maintained system will save you money, water, and time.
- 6. Consider replacing some turf area with low water-use plants and ornamental grasses. They are easier to maintain than turf, look beautiful, and require far less water.
- 7. Group plants with like watering needs. Creating "watering zones" in your garden will allow you to give each plant the water it requires not too much or too little.
- Add a shut-off nozzle to your garden hose and save about 5-7 gallons each minute your hose is on.
- Adjust your mower to a higher setting. A taller lawn provides shade to the roots and helps retain soil moisture, so your lawn requires less water.
- **10. Apply the amount of water your soil can absorb.** Water thoroughly, but infrequently. If run off or puddling occurs, break longer watering sessions into several short sessions allowing water to soak into the soil between each session.



Avoid becoming the Victim of Summertime Crime

Tip #1:

The Columbia River Gorge is an area where car break-ins happen year-round. Here are three ways to help you avoid becoming the victim of a car break-in:


- Secure your vehicle
- Don't leave valuables in plain sight
- Stow valuables before you park

Car prowlers like to window shop. Things like wallets, purses, laptops, tablets, cell phones, backpacks, or shopping bags left where thieves can see them can make your car a target. Remember, car break-ins are a crime of opportunity. Don't give thieves the opportunity.

It's common for car prowlers to hang around parking lots and watch for potential victims. You don't want them to see you put your valuables in the trunk. Instead, plan ahead. Leave valuables at home or take them with you on your outing. If you can't do either, stop somewhere safe along the way and stow them in the trunk before you get to your destination.

Tip #2:

As temperatures heat up, we are all inclined to find ways to cool off. Often, we will open doors and windows to allow a cooling breeze though our home. Open doors and windows also allow easy access for unwanted visitors. Don't forget to close and lock windows and doors when you're not home.
