Bulky Waste Event

When: Saturday, May 6, prior to 6 a.m.

Where: At YOUR curb

What to know: Instead of hauling your bulky waste to another location, you can simply set out a variety of bulky items at the curb for FREE pick-up as part of our Spring Cleanup event! Place the items at the curb by 6 a.m. on Saturday, May 6 to be eligible for free pick-up. The volume placed at the curb should be roughly equivalent to five garbage cans or less.


<u>Accepted</u> bulky items include: Bicycles, mattresses, BBQs, appliances, carpet, scrap metal, tires, plumbing fixtures, windows, furniture, lawn mowers. <u>Not accepted</u> at the curb: Paint, hazardous materials, liquids, propane tanks, car batteries, dirt, sod and stumps, rock, concrete, industrial and commercial waste, household garbage and E-waste (computers, TVs, printers, etc.) (*More events on Page 4*)

* If you do not pay your water bill to Troutdale, you are not eligible to take part in the Bulky Waste or other Spring Cleanup events. Call Troutdale City Hall at 503-665-5175 to confirm your residency.

Troutdale Hires Ray Young

Ray Young was appointed to the position of City Manager by the City Council on March 14th following a recruitment process that began in the fall of 2016. Ray had been serving as Interim City Manager after the retirement of Craig Ward on December 31, 2016.

Update

Downtown Parking Lot

Following the construction of the new Troutdale Police Community Center at 234 SW Kendall Court, the former Police Department building at 141 SE Dora Avenue was demolished in the summer of 2013. Since that time, the property has been in a temporary use status as an under-improved public parking lot while the City determined the longterm fate of the property and obtained an access variance from the County for its dual-street access. After much consideration and discussion, the City Council determined to continue its usage as a

public parking lot and to complete improvements necessary to bring the parking lot up to current standards for long-term use. This project will regrade, repave and restripe the parking lot, as well as add stormwater quality treatment, landscaping, lighting, retaining wall, ADA parking and planters to bring the parking lot up to current development code standards and enhance its usability for the public. This project is currently on hold pending completion of a downtown parking study. The study is expected to be completed in 2017.

If You Plan to Hit "The Sandy" on the First Hot Day

AMR lifeguards at Glenn Otto Park return, starting Memorial Day through Labor Day

People packing coolers along Historic Columbia River Highway, and slow, heavy traffic all the way to



Glenn Otto Park. Destination? The Sandy River, of course. Before you swim, be aware that the Sandy in spring and early summer can be particularly treacherous. Justine Kilsby, AMR River Rescue Program Coordinator, describes the river conditions early in the season: "It's important to remember that our smaller rivers can rise quite a bit with rain, and very quickly. River height can change by a foot in as little as an hour. This year, there's quite a bit more water than most summertime visitors will remember – and more water means that it will have faster currents. Water temperatures are currently in the mid-forties Fahrenheit, which is not something people will want to swim in without wetsuits. In comparison the ocean at Lincoln City is currently in the low fifties Fahrenheit!"

From Memorial Day through Labor Day, American Medical Response (AMR) River Safety Program will provide two lifeguards at the Sandy River (Glenn Otto Park) from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. Lifejackets are available for rent.



Hiking Tips from the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office "Green Hornets"

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) Green Hornet Wilderness Law Enforcement

include:

Services and Trail Rescue Team (Green Hornets) is a small team of Law Enforcement Division members who are physically fit endurance athletes experienced with hiking, trail running and advanced search and rescue skills. The Green Hornets were designed to be an on-call resource to augment the MCSO Search and Rescue Unit in "hasty" trail searches for lost/missing/injured hikers in the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area as well as other wilderness areas frequented by local citizens and tourists. The Green Hornets also provide an additional patrol resource at major trailhead parking areas and educate hikers with tips on how to enjoy their visit to scenic areas while having the least amount of risk. Some of these tips

- Have a plan: Before you set out on your hike, make sure to notify someone of your destination, timeline, and make a plan in case you don't return at your expected time.
- Stay on the trail: Forests in this region are very dense, thick overgrowth can mask dangerously steep drop-offs, and it is easy to become disoriented.
- **Stay together:** Keep track of each other; regroup periodically, especially near junctions; and monitor each other's condition for dehydration, hypothermia and fatigue.
- Avoid undue risks: Climbing waterfalls and following narrow ridgelines or gulches off the trail can place you in danger. Rock climbing is extremely dangerous and has resulted in fatal accidents...don't take the chance.
- Monitor the weather: When hiking into valleys or crossing streams, be mindful of rain conditions along the mountain top or ridges that can suddenly raise the water level. Use extreme caution if attempting to cross a swollen stream...rushing water is very powerful. It is better to find an alternative route, or wait until the water subsides.
- Watch the time: Getting a late start increases the possibility of getting caught in the dark. Know your turnaround time and stick to it.
- When might you need emergency assistance? When an
 injury or illness prevents walking; when extremely bad weather
 hits; when it's too dark to see; when you're extremely fatigued or dehydrated; when you're disoriented or lost; or
 when you're stranded, scared and unable to move.
- Call 9-1-1: Ask for the Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue Unit. Tell them which trail you're on and what happened.
- Be visible: Wear brightly colored clothing and carry a flashlight in case you are out after dark.
- Be noisy: Use a whistle to attract attention.
- **Stay calm:** Objectively assess your situation before making any decision. Stay calm and positive.
- Stay put: You will be found more quickly and reduce the chances of getting into further trouble, especially after dark, by staying in one place.
- Stay warm: Wind and rain can drain your body of warmth, and be life-threatening. Get out of the wind and use your rain gear or extra clothes to stay warm.

We hope that everyone has a safe and enjoyable experience exploring some of our nation's most beautiful, wild and scenic locations offered in Troutdale's own backyard - the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area. This spring and summer, look for the Green Hornets to be training at recreation areas near you. Look for the sign (at left) in the public parking lot area of the Center.

With the location being in such close proximity to the police station, access to law enforcement is available 24/7. You can now make your exchange in a protected environment - right here in Troutdale.

Learn Water Rescue and Lifesaving Skills Free instruction May 20

Benjamin Klopp is a young man on a mission – to educate youth and adults about water safety and lifesaving skills. As a current Boy Scout in Troop #174, he is aiming for Eagle Scout status, and his final project will be to create, organize and oversee a course in lifesaving skills – open to the public – at the pool at Reynolds Swim Center on Saturday, May 20. The event is from 2-5 p.m. and will feature six separate stations where participants can learn first aid water rescue skills in all kinds of circumstances. Gresham Emergency and Fire Services will have a station in the parking lot where you can try on safety equipment and see how it works in real-life situations.
