## **Harlow House: 1900**

National Register: 726 E. Historic Columbia River Highway  
**The house was built by Fred Harlow in 1900 on the large farm owned by his father, Captain John Harlow, who platted the town of Troutdale with his wife Celestia.**



## **Troutdale Methodist Evangelical Church: 1895**

National Register: 302 SE Harlow Street  
**One of the oldest buildings in Troutdale, the church was built as a Methodist Church and later used by the Presbyterian congregation.**



## **Alfred Baker Copper Beech Tree: c. 1883**

South of Stark Street, east of Mt. Hood Community College


**Planted by Alfred Baker on his farm about 1883.**



## **2nd Williams-Althaus House: 1929 & associated Black Walnut Trees**

4220 S Troutdale Road

The Colonial Style house was built by Emmett Bigelow Williams on the site of the Sweetbriar Farm. Williams was a attorney in Portland who resided in his Troutdale home in the summers. His daughter Lenore Althaus inherited the property.

## Depot Building: 1907

473 E. Historic Columbia River Highway

**This building replaced the first Troutdale railroad depot in 1907. Threatened with demolition, the building was moved to its present site in 1976. The depot represents the city's early dependence on the railroad for transportation of goods and people.**

## **Bissinger Water Tower: c. 1930**

301 257th Street west of Sandy River, north of tracks  
**Part of the Bissinger Wool Pullery business**



## **Blaser House: c. 1930**

1004 E Historic Columbia River Highway  
**English Tudor style house originally owned by Herman Blaser, Troutdale mayor and owner of Blaser Fruit Co. Blaser bought local berries and sold them to East Coast markets.**



# **Bramhall House: 1909**

2033 SE Dora Court

Home of prominent Troutdale builder Harry Bramhall and his wife Emilie. Bramhall built many of Troutdale's early buildings including the Harlow House.



# **Corbett Hopkins/Singer House: 1904**

2035 SE Troutdale Road

Built by Corbett and Nellie Hopkins, prominent farmers in Troutdale, the house is surrounded by some of the original acreage. Distinctive features of the house are the Colonial columns along the front porch.



# **Elmer House: c. 1920**

27324 SE Stark Street

Originally built by the Williams family (owners of Sweetbriar Farm), William and Roslie Elmer were later residents of the house. The house is a good example of a Norman Tudor Farmhouse with distinctive corner turret.



# **Handy Brothers Gas Station: c. 1930**

146 W. Historic Columbia River Highway


Constructed as a Texaco station in the Mission style, the building was added to over the years, and housed different offices and businesses. The Handys purchased the building in the 1940s and opened a Union 76 gas station.



# Hope Gardens: 1905

1675 SW Cherry Park Road

The house, named Hope Gardens, was built as a spec house in an early development called Cherry Park Orchard tract. The mature landscape features represents the early development of the property.



# Kendall Bulb House: c. 1927

105 SW Second Street

Constructed by contractor Harry Bramhall for A.D. Kendall and Clarence Parsons. The building served as a storage house for gladioli when the bulb business was one of the area's major industries.



# **Kendall House: 1928**

226 W. Historic Columbia River Highway

Constructed by contractor Harry Bramhall for A.D. Kendall, Troutdale's railroad station agent. The Bungalow style house has crushed glass in the exterior stucco siding. The house was later occupied by the Lambert family, local farmers.



# **Kienow Estate: c. 1945**

2187 SE Crown Point Highway

The post-WWII Ranch style house was built by Dan Kienow, owner of the Kienow Supermarket chain.



# **Olsen House (Cedarplace): 1907**

2611 SE Troutdale Road

**Built by wealthy Portlander, Emil Olsen, the home is a classic two-story, Four Square style farmhouse.**



# **Strebin House & Farm: c. 1950**

2720 Troutdale Road

**The house, a post-WWII Roman Brick Ranch Style home, was built by the Strebin family, prominent farmers in the area.**



# Tiller Hotel: 1907-08

202-209 E. Historic Columbia River Highway

The Tillers built the hotel/café after the 1907 fire. The building is the oldest commercial building in downtown Troutdale.



# Troutdale Bank Building: 1920

102 W. Historic Columbia River Highway

The bank, constructed in 1920, was built of fire-proof brick and was the second bank erected in town. The bank closed its doors in 1933 during the Great Depression.



# Troutdale Elementary School: 1926-27

648 SE Harlow Road

The fourth Troutdale school, the building was erected for \$29,000 by contractor M.C. Arthur. Expanded in the late 1940s/early 1950s, the school still serves the community today.



# Troutdale City Hall: 1922-23

104 SE Kibling Street

Constructed on land purchased by the City for \$650, the building housed City offices on the first floor and a dance floor on the second. The building, erected for \$3,700, is one of the few wood city halls remaining in Oregon that is still used for its original function.

### **McMenamin's Edgefield Manor: 1911**

National Register: 2126 SW Halsey Street

Multnomah County Poor Farm, opened in 1911, was a self sustaining community that housed many types of people in need. In 1947, the building was changed into Edgefield Manor, a facility for the elderly.
